manages conservation and breeding programs for many

Toilets

Toilet facilities are clearly marked on our park map. These toilets are accessible to the general public and are checked regularly by out cleaners.

Student Lunches We suggest that students bring a small back pack (can be shared between 2 or 3 students) with their lunch and a water bottle which they can carry during the day.

We do not have a location for lunches to be left during the day.

Water bottles can be refilled during the day at water fountain. Check the Sanctuary map for locations.

Where to eat

Schools who are bringing their own lunch can eat at a range of locations in the Sanctuary.

Free Flight Bird Show seating #37 on the western side of the Sanctuary— it is available after 11.15am (shaded)*

Australiana Sheep Shearing Show seating #38 on the western side of the Sanctuary – it is available after 11.45am (shaded)*

Aboriginal Dance Ground seating #35 in the centre of the Sanctuary (partly shaded)*

*at certain times (during school holidays and other events) there may be additional shows running at these locations which make them unavailable at the show times. Please confirm availability on check in.

Please note that the Red Tent is booked for tour groups for lunch most days and café seating is for café patrons only

Weather

Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary is primarily an outdoor venue with some enclosed learning spaces. It is suggested students bring a rain jacket if showers are predicted. Schools may reschedule bookings due to weather. Please ensure the education department gets notified no later than 9am on the day of the visit.

Supervision

It is the responsibility of the school to ensure students are **actively** and effectively supervised during their visit to Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary. We encourage the excursion coordinator to develop a supervisory plan that will ensure students are accompanied throughout their visit to Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary.

Misconduct may result in the immediate expulsion of students from the zoo grounds, and may be required to pay for damage or costs incurred.

To assist in supervision, Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary has offered schools the following supervisor/ student ratios:

Age Group Student	Free of Charge Adult: Supervision ratio
Special Needs	1:2
Primary School	1.5
High	1:10
Adult	1:10 (supervision not required)

It is compulsory that students in years K- Year 8 are allocated to groups with a supervising adult for the duration of their visit to Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary.

We encourage senior school groups (Year 9- 12, tertiary), to meet through the day at a pre-determined location around the park. We ask that teachers please maintain a visible profile to your students while they are at Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary.

Areas of the park that require special supervision include:

- Blinky Bill's Tree House
- Wild Island (please note that secondary school students are not permitted in Wild Island as it is designed for 0-12 year olds).
- Kangaroo Paddock
- Riding on the train (School students must be under active and effective adult supervision on the train)
- Gift shops

Health and Safety Currumbin wildlife sanctuary provides toilets and special sanitising gel stations, where students are given the opportunity to touch animals. Please ensure your students wash their hands.

> It is particularly important that visitors do not feed or interfere with our animals.

Many Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary staff hold first aid certificates and can utilise the radio for immediate communication should the safety or welfare of a student be at risk.

Should first aid be required, please go directly to a CWS staff member or volunteer for assistance.

Emergency

Response Plan

Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary has a documented emergency response plan in place. Points covered in the document:

- Evacuation and exit gate procedures
- Fire Warden protocol
- Coded alarm system for potential life threatening situations e.g. fire, serious first aid incident, Dangerous animal escape, or bomb threat

In the event of an emergency, please contact a staff member or volunteer immediately.

Student Behaviour

Below are some simple reminders for your students:

- 1. Please be courteous to animals and people .(Please consider your group's volume around animals and visitors)
- 2. Please be safe on the train by keeping all arms legs and head within the train carriage. (School students must be under active and effective adult supervision on the train)
- 3. Do not feed or interfere with the wild and captive animals within Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary.
- 4. Place rubbish in the bins provided.
- 5. Random animal photo opportunities, offered after presentations, are for public guest only therefore, we ask that students are directed away from these photo areas.
- 6. Gift Shops: If students would like to 'go shopping' they are more than welcome to do so, we do however ask that classes are divided into groups of no bigger than 10 and are accompanied by a teacher/carer.
